

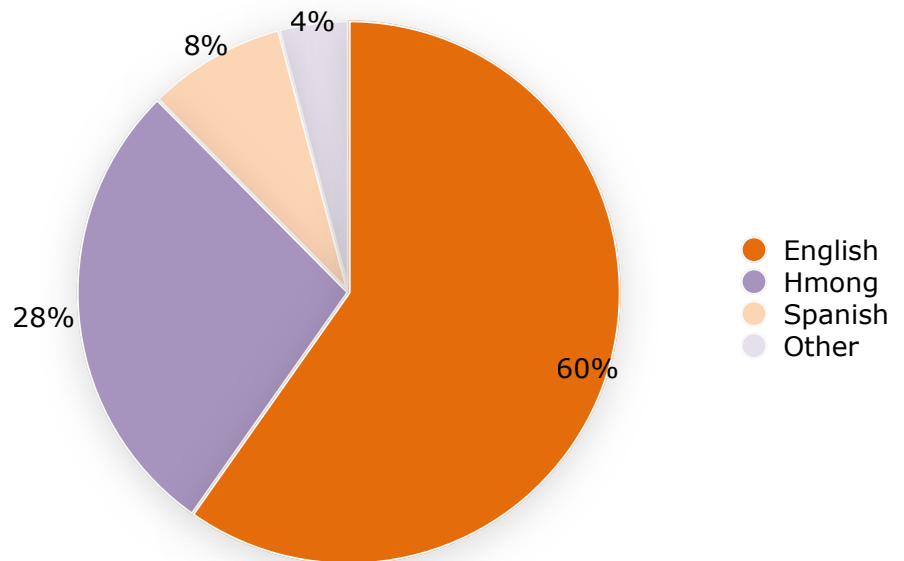
Translations: A Newsletter for the Community
